

Status of ID Implementation in 4 OECS Member States (Cont.)

Foundational Systems

- Foundational civil registration process is well developed
 - Process is not digitalized
 - No Population Registry/Residential Registry in place
- No Unique ID being issued from birth and terminated at death

Supporting Framework (Legal, Policy, Technology)

- Integration between foundational systems and between foundational and functional identity systems required.
- Biometric information (e.g., fingerprints) collected in two countries, but not provided/stored within foundational systems.
 - Legislation Framework to support the regulation of national identity management, including digitization aspects, as well as privacy, security aspects and foresee regional integration aspects related to unique ID needed.
 - Governance Structure required




