

- Physical Connectivity focusing on digital infrastructure and led by The Gambia
- Digital Connectivity focusing on digital transformation and the digital economy and led by Mauritius
- Regulatory Connectivity focusing on the regulatory environment for MSMEs and led by Barbados
- Business-to-Business Connectivity focusing on improving Commonwealth business links and led by Bangladesh
- Supply Side Connectivity focusing on participation and upgrading of MSMEs in agribusiness value chains and led by Vanuatu





Trade cost breakdown for Caribbean countries




The Commonwealth Caribbean region faces persistently high trade costs, which pose significant challenges to economic growth and international competitiveness.

Countries like Belize, Saint Lucia, and the Bahamas bear some of the highest trade costs in the region, with costs exceeding 80% of trade revenue in some cases.



Reduction in total trade costs




Many countries in the region face high trade costs that consume a significant portion of trade revenues, above the Commonwealth average but digitization can dramatically shift this balance.

This reduction is driven by the elimination of time-consuming paper-based processes, faster customs clearance, and lower logistical costs.



Additional trade for Caribbean countries




The shift to digital processes could unlock billions in new trade flows across the region by reducing the time and cost associated with crossborder transactions – coupled with benefits such as better access to finance.

Paperless trade reduces bottlenecks at the borders, streamlines documentation, cuts down on delays, and expands access to finance.

Commonwealth trade gains

Around **US\$90 billion** could be added to Commonwealth trade if border and transportation costs, alongside the costs associated with the informal economy, could be reduced.

By combining the impact of cost reductions and greater access to finance, there could be as much as a **US\$1.1 trillion** increase in Commonwealth trade by 2026...

...bringing the total benefits from paperless trade to nearly **US\$1.2 trillion** by 2026...


